Before you start

Please read this page before the children do

Adult supervision is required for every activity in this pack. Children under 12 are more impulsive and less able to follow multi-step safety instructions than adults, and there is no substitute for direct supervision (U.S. CPSC, Art and Craft Safety Guide, Pub. 5015).

Steps marked ADULT STEP are for an adult to do

- not for a child with an adult watching. They are marked that way for a reason.

Materials

Paper or thin card, crayons or washable markers, and child-safety scissors to cut out the cards. Use art materials labelled for children and marked "Conforms to ASTM D-4236". Do not substitute a material carrying a caution or warning label - CPSC advises against those for children through grade 6. Even materials labelled non-toxic can be harmful if used in a way they were not intended for.

While you work

Keep food and drink out of the work area. An adult does the cutting for younger children. Wash hands afterwards.

Small pieces

Once cut out, the cards are small paper pieces. Not suitable for children under 3, who may put them in their mouths - keep cut cards away from little ones.

These are drawing pages - crayons and, if you cut anything, child-safety scissors.

How to use these

Some children show you their day before they can tell you

Let them draw it, then ask about the drawing.

"How was your day?" is a hard question to answer out loud. A drawing is an easier door. Give your child a page and a prompt, let them draw, and then ask them about what they drew - "tell me about this one" opens far more than a question ever does.

There are no wrong drawings here. A scribble is a story if you ask about it.

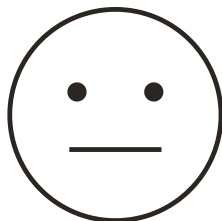
Print the page that fits the day, or the whole set. Keep the good ones.

Colour the face that matches your day



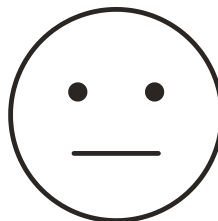

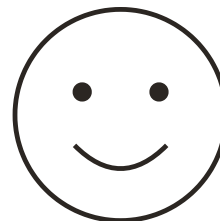
